### Alex McLeod Lecture

Dr. Alex McLeod, on Sunday, October 30, presented an interesting lecture on three families with ties to Princeton University and the Sandhills. The Boyd, Yeomans, and Embury influence on this area created a unique cultural setting that remains today. Weaving the story together as a "tartan", Dr. McLeod revealed little-known facts about the connection of these three families and the lasting effect of their contributions on the literary, architectural and landscape values of the Sandhills.

Dr. McLeod has generously donated the slides and the paper derived from the talk to the MCHA archives.

### Mystery Trip

Led by Marilyn Hartsell on November 2nd, an adventurous group headed west, their first stop, Reed Gold Mine, a NC Historic Site located in Midland, the first documented gold find in the United States. From there, gold mining spread to nearby counties. During its peak, gold mining was second only to farming in the number of North Carolinians it employed, the estimated value of gold recovered reaching over \$1,000,000 a year. North Carolina led the nation in production until 1848, when the California gold rush began.

After lunch the group enjoyed Dennis Vineyards Winery. The last stop was in downtown Albemarle to visit Sculptor Roger Martin, who had recently completed a bust of the Duke of Albemarle commissioned for the new city hall. A slideshow presented the process from concept to finishing the patina on the bronze. We toured the gallery and studio housed in a beautifully restored former 1916 grocery/rooming house.

## MCHA Spring History Tour

Apr. 24-25, 2012 to Eastern North Carolina

Bath, the oldest town in NC (1705) is a stop on the Spring Tour and includes the Palmer-Marsh House (1751) as well as the oldest church in NC, St. Thomas Episcopal (1734). On Lake Phelps is a 14-room pre-Civil War plantation house (1830). At the peak of plantation life, Somerset had 100,000 acres and produced rice, wheat and corn. Antebellum plantation life and African-American customs and traditions are highlighted. Near Washington, NC we visit the NC Estuarium. Through exhibits, art work, films and aquariums, we learn what happens where fresh water meets salt. A pontoon boat tour on the Tar-Pamlico is an option. At Waynesborough Historical Village we may slip back to the 19th Century and visit ten buildings that comprised this faded town. We tour a family home, Quaker Meeting House, medical and law offices and more as well as watch a blacksmith at work.

### Cannon Ball Found at Shaw House

During a Moore County Historical Association board meeting the question was asked if the cannon ball sitting by the front steps was safe. The cannon ball had been found under a bush during a clean up day. Some research was done and we found out that some civil war cannon balls still have high explosives and some are unstable and can explode. With this information in hand a call was made to the Southern Pines Police Department for assistance.

The police department responded and contacted the Bomb Disposal Unit from Fort Bragg. The Bomb Disposal Unit arrived and determined that the cannon ball would need to be transported to Fort Bragg and x-rayed to determine if it held explosives. If it did contain explosives it would be detonated and destroyed.

We have not heard back from the Ft. Bragg Bomb Disposal Unit as to the disposition of the cannon ball.

## Shaw House Undergoes **Extensive Repairs**

The historic Shaw House has new boards both outside and underneath its foundation, replacing rotted, termite-infested wood. Electrical wiring under the 1820s era wooden cabin, was brought up to code, with the home of the Moore County Historical Association in Southern Pines good for another 50-100 years. Board member Greg Zywocinski recommended that the board hire contractor Butch Chandler

to handle the job, after MCHA President Steadman Meares noticed some rotted areas with termites around a windowsill. Similar work was also necessary on the Sanders Cabin. The total cost was \$3,900 to MCHA.

### Colonial Dames Presents Charter to Shaw House

The Colonial Dames, XVII (17th) Century, Deep River Chapter, presented a framed copy of their charter to the Moore County Historical Association recently to display in the Shaw House historic dwelling and office for the MCHA.

Lora Buelow of Seven Lakes, president of the chapter, handed the charter over to Vickie Rounds, co-president of the MCHA at the Shaw House. Also present were the state Society President Hollie Holland of Greensboro, and Libby McAtees, Organizing Secretary General of the

National Society, of Monroe. The State Insignia Chairman Bernice Snuggs, Sue Aceves, State

Music Chairman, and Bobbie Lou Ray, Honorary State President. Representing the MCHA were Vickie Rounds and Steady Meares, co-presidents, Beverly Offutt, docent chairman, and Greg Zywocinsky, a board member.

"We are glad the Charter has a home," said Holland. The Deep River Chapter was chartered Nov. 21, 1991 and now has 33 members. A person may become a member as long as they have ancestors that can be documented to North Carolina from before 1701. The members must be descendants of someone or family members who were free and contributing members of colonial society.

Offutt told the group the MCHA is "very glad you brought this...we'll do our best to give it a good home."

The Charter contains the names of founding members. There are 46 states out of the 50 in the U.S with chartered Colonial Dames. The MCHA welcomes new members. People may join the Association no matter where they are from. She gave a short history of the MCHA, which was founded in 1946.

Offutt said the Shaw House site has a corn crib, a smoke house and a tobacco barn on the premises from the old days, along with two settlers' cabins from northern Moore: The Britt Sanders Cabin and the Garner House. The Shaw House itself was built in 1821 and was lived in by descendants of the original builder until 1948 when it was given to the MCHA. The Sanders and Garner dwellings date back to the 1700s and the Shaw House to 1821.
