Inspections of the buildings have revealed a number of repairs to be made. Mr. John Larson, Vice President of Restoration at Old Salem, has provided his professional expertise and knowledge to the project. Meanwhile, plans for termite and powder post beetle extermination for both buildings are in process. Additional information will be available as a scope of work is developed for the project.

The McLendon's loved the soil of our country, and acquired many acres of land, either by purchase or grant.

The McLendons

The MacLennans are an ancient Clan of descent from the Royal Celtic families of Scotland and Ireland.

All of Thomas' (Joel McLendon's father) children appear in Cumberland Co., N.C., receiving land grants and buying land. Many of the deeds refer to McLendon Creek, which rises in west Moore County and flows into Deep River. From 1748 to 1754 known as Buck Creek. Named for Joel McLendon, who settled there about 1748 and married Tamer Beverly.

Joel McLendon is acknowledged as the original owner of the McLendon Cabin. His ancestors migrated to Perquimans County, North Carolina from Scotland prior to 1696. Research by Melba Goff Allen dates his birth at 1722 and his death at around 1800.

It appears that the third "first family of Moore" was the McLendon family. Joel, Jacob, Jemima, and Thomas McLendon settled in 1748 at and above the mouth of Buck, now McLendon's, Creek. Of with Irish or Ulster Scot extraction, they were large land owners prior to 1760, about which time they moved on to Anson County.

The creeksides were where the house had been built, and the creeks were called variously and vividly. They were McLendon's Creek, for Joel, Jacob and Jemima McLendon, who had lived there but a score of years and, departing, left their patryonic lingering on the waters......

In the year 1758, Joel received a grant for two hundred acres, lying on both sides of the creek, and it was on this tract that he made his home, built a grist-mill and cleared much land.

On October 26, 1779, Joel conveyed the northern half (100 acres) to William Barrett. In this deed he refers to himself as "of Montgomery county," indicating that he no longer lived in Moore. Finally, on November 20, 1787, he conveyed the southern half (100 acres) including the house, barns and mill, to Robert Graham. It is pretty certain that with this sale to Graham, the McLendons cut their ties with Moore County, and returned to Old Anson.


