# **Upcoming Events**

"The Sandhills: The Comfort of Tradition and Ritual" Lecture, Jan. 24 by Mary Wayne Watson First Baptist Church, 200 East New York Avenue, Southern Pines 2:00 pm. No admission charge.

The Sandhills is rich in Scottish history. Descendants of Scots who emigrated to Moore, Scotland, Richmond and surrounding counties in the 1700s remain proud and aware of the "old country" heritage.

The Moore County Historical Association sponsors "The Sandhills" exploring this fascinating history. Longtime teacher and scholar Mary Wayne Watson will give the program Sunday, Jan. 24, 2 p.m., the lecture open to the public.

Centering on Scottish folk traditions still preserved in Scotland County, which borders Moore, the program tells of a tradition known as Riverton Nights, a gathering at a tiny settlement near the Lumbee River, where everyone who wants to perform, may. The Riverton gatherings resemble the original ceileidghs of the Scottish Highlands.

Scotland Co. native Mary Watson comes "home" for her talk, she being the great-niece of John Charles McNeill, beloved poet of the early 20th century associated with Riverton. In his day, McNeill was also a lawyer elected to the state legislature, largely on the strength of his poems about the Sandhills.



### Longstreet Church and Cemetery Day Tour, Feb. 10

Longstreet Presbyterian Church, located in the Fort Bragg military reservation on Longstreet Road near the Sicily Drop Zone, was organized by Highland Scots around 1756. The white clapboard building, maintained in original condition, was erected around 1845. Some historical accounts refer to Longstreet as the mother of Presbyterian churches in the area.

The government agreed to preserve the church when the land was bought for a military reservation in 1918. The National Historic Landmark is protected by federal and state law. Grounds are open for a special memorial service by the 18th Airborne Corps each year on the last Sunday of June. Descendants of church members hold their annual reunion at the service. The four-acre site includes a cemetery for about 30 Confederate soldiers.

# MCHA's Slate of Events for the Palustris Festival A new festival, "Palustris," celebrating Sandhills of time March 25-28, 2010. Spearheaded by the A

A new festival, "Palustris," celebrating Sandhills culture will be held for the first time March 25-28, 2010. Spearheaded by the Arts Council of Moore County, along with the Convention & Visitors Bureau, local civic organizations will be offering more than 75 events at venues across the region. MCHA will be a major participant, having The Shaw House open from 1:00-4:00 pm throughout the celebration, with docents giving guided tours. The Association will also sponsor a pair of concerts and two theatrical performances in addition to co-sponsoring a concert by recording artist Tift Merritt, the festival's headline event. Tift Merritt will perform on Saturday, March 27, at Pinecrest High School auditorium starting at 8:00 pm. MCHA Board Member Nancy Blount is a personal friend to Ms. Merritt and helped make the performance possible. Merritt earned a Grammy nomination in 2004 for her album, "Tambourine," and a single from her latest album, "Another Country," received an AMA Award nomination. Tickets for Tift Merritt's concert are \$25 each and can be purchased from ACMC by calling (910) 692-4356. A performance called "Greeting the Train with the Sounds of Southern Pines Memory" will be held on Saturday, March 27, at 10:00 am at the train station, downtown Southern Pines. The free program has its roots in two historical greetings that helped found the town. In the years of settlement an African-American choir greeted incoming trains, and potential northern immigrants met with representatives from local Scottish families. Rev. Douglas Kelly, President of Scottish Heritage USA, along with an African-American speaker, will lead the Lord's Prayer in Gaelic, to be repeated in English, this to be followed by the St. Andrews College bag pipe band, ending with the African-American choir singing "Together in Unity." The presentation will bear witness to the power of our culture, with roots reaching back for generations. Members of Sept of Blue Clan MacMillian are promoting the event, and plan to attend, tartan-clad and flag waving. MCHA has two concerts scheduled for the afternoon of Saturday, March 27, both to be held at Old Bethesda Presbyterian Church in Aberdeen. The first performance will begin at 1:30 pm, and features banjo player Larry McNeeley, a longtime member of Roy Acuff's "Smokey Mountain Boys" who has worked with artists such as Glen Campbell and the Smothers Brother. McNeeley's concert will benefit the Bryant House and McLendon Cabin. Admission is \$12 per person.

A second performance at Old Bethesda on March 27 will begin at 3:30 PM, and will feature Craig Fuller and his son Patrick. Craig was the co-founder of

the band Pure Prairie League and was the front man for the band Little Feat. Admission for the Craig and Patrick Fuller performance will be \$12 per person. For information about either of the concerts, call MCHA at (910) 692-2051. The final event, a performance of the play "Oldest Living Confederate Widow: Her Confession," is scheduled for 3:30 pm on Sunday, March 28, at Old Bethesda Presbyterian Church. Starring Jane Holding, and directed by Katja Hill, the play was written by Holding and author Allan Gurganus and is based on his best-selling novel, "The Oldest Living Confederate Widow Tells All."
