Thanks to the late Dr. Robert Gale Martin, one of the founders of Carolina Eye Associates, the Moore County Historical Association obtained and has awarded salvage rights to the grandson of the builder of an historic old cottage or clubhouse built in the 1920s, long abandoned and located behind Carolina Eye.

The building is the only remaining structure from an unusual custom bow and arrow manufacturing business on Midland Road, called Archers Company. Mike Thompson of Southern Pines submitted the high bid in March, 2010, allowing him to salvage parts worth saving of the former Archers Cottage. The small stucco cottage served as a clubhouse for the elite customers from nearby Pinehurst who took instruction, tried out, and ordered the archery products made by skilled craftsmen from the Archers Company that occupied a separate building on an adjoining lot. The company was established in 1926 on Midland Road by a New Orleans businessman to serve as an amenity for The Carolina Hotel guests, by permission of Richard Tufts whose family established and owned the resort at the time. Archery was popular as a sport all over the United States, and Moore County was no exception with the help of Archers Company, which sponsored instruction and competitions.

Mike Thompson's grandfather Carl Thompson Sr. was the President of Archers Company, taking over in 1931, and he was the last, as the Depression overtook the business as it did many others. Thompson Sr., a craftsman and archery champion in his own right, built parts of the clubhouse, which Mike has discovered has teak flooring and stamped wood with the name of the company on it.

A couple of years ago, then-Carolina Eye employee Sue Pockmire, a volunteer with MCHA, had mentioned the successful completion of another architectural salvage project where the association had been given salvage rights, then allowed people to buy key elements of soon-to-be removed historic old cottages that a church wanted to tear down. Dr. Martin readily agreed on the spot to donate salvage rights to the Archers Cottage to MCHA when the time came that Carolina Eye would need to remove the building for expansion. That time has come and it will be removed after the Thompson descendants finish taking out what's worth saving, including a rock chimney made of soft stone and the exotic teak parts.

Luckily Mike Thompson learned of the bidding this spring for rights to salvage his grandfather's cottage, and he scraped together the money to obtain what's left of Archery Company for the family history. Both the Thompsons and MCHA came out winners!

Bring your own lawn chair on Sunday, June 6, for MCHA's Annual Meeting and a special treat: An outdoor get-together starting at 3 p.m. at the famous old house owned by the author of "Sand in My Shoes." Historian Ray Owen will give the program, Peach Farming & Pumpelly Family, highlighting details from the 1920s when peach orchards were the thing in the Sandhills and the Raphael Pumpelly orchards (and those of others) covered the land where Samarkand Youth Development Center now stands off N.C. 211 at Eagle Springs.

The meeting will be at the historic home of Mr. and Mrs. Clement Williams, who live in the house that Katharine Ball Ripley wrote about in "Sand in My Shoes," a book about living on a peach farm for seven years, trying to make a go of it back in the 1920s. Ripley's book is still in print thanks to the Down Home Press and the Moore County Historical Association. It may be purchased at the Shaw House and at the meeting. Annual reports and the introduction of new trustees will be followed by refreshments including ice cream. The Williamses will allow us to tour the lower floor of their historic home.

The Williams' home is six miles from the stoplight at Seven Lakes on N.C. 211. Take a left off Highway 211 onto Clement Road, go a quarter mile and the house is on the left.

A Day Trip to Kenansville

Wednesday, September 22, 2010, Leaving from the Shaw House Members and Non-Members Cost to be Announced

A guided tour of Liberty Hall Plantation, built in the early 19th century by Thomas Kenan II. This two-story homestead is an outstanding example of Greek Revival Architecture, the eleven rooms fully decorated in period style, with its parlor having hosted the wedding of Henry Flagler and Mary Lily Kenan in 1901. On the grounds we will tour the overseer's cottage, carriage house, chicken coop and smokehouse. Next door is the Chowan Museum that is housed in an 1848 house and features several thousand rare and unusual artifacts of early rural America. On the grounds are a log school house, one room log cabin, a country store, a post office, and a log tobacco barn.

We will lunch at the historic Country Squire, winery and gift shop, after which we have the rare opportunity of visiting Buckner Hill Plantation (1762 – current dwelling circa 1855). While touring the house, we will be reminded of the Warner Bros.' "Divine Secrets of the Ya-Ya Sisterhood," filmed there. Dr. Hill who built the house was one of the wealthiest men in NC. (John Sprunt Hill was his great nephew.)

Mid-afternoon begins our return to Southern Pines with great memories of our day in Kenansville. Call Sarah (692-2051) or Marilyn (692-2365) to reserve your space, transportation to be by van or car depending upon the number attending.

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LOCAL GUN FACTORY PUT OUT WAR WEAPONS

(Excerpted from an article published in the Centennial Edition of The Moore County News, February 19, 1975) By Hilda Bukowski

On the "falls of Bear Creek" at the site where today stands the Robbins Water Plant, there once flourished a plant which was "the largest gun factory in this part of the South" and employed as many as 75 hands. During the early 1800's the Kennedy gun factory was Moore County's most important industry according to Blackwell P. Robinson in his book on Moore County history.

History and legends are unclear as to the exact particulars of the factory's founding. Powell Kennedy recorded that, during the Revolutionary War, Alexander Kennedy of Philadelphia, a gunsmith, fled with tools and equipment as the British threatened that city. He settled in upper Moore County where he soon began again to supply the Continental army with the Kennedy rifles.

Robinson wrote, however, that the gun works were established in 1795 by David Kennedy, son of Alexander Kennedy, who bought part interest in a small gun shop owned by William Williams. Kennedy later bought out Williams' interest.

Various types of guns and swords were produced at the factory. It became known as Mechanic's Hill and also included a saw mill. Water-powered grindstones shaped the barrels which were molded around a steel rod and welded from end to end. The more expensive rifles were heavily ornamented with silver obtained by melting down silver dollars.

By 1809 or 1810, Kennedy's profits were said to have reached \$15,000 a year. The factory produced some 650 rifles a year, each of which sold for \$25 or more.

The rifles were used during the War of 1812, but by the 1830's business was lagging. After several financial reverses, David Kennedy sold his factory for a pittance and his 300 acres of land for \$4, and he moved to Alabama. Soon after, gold was discovered on the land, bringing its new owners several thousand dollars.

Kennedy's brother John continued to produce guns in Moore County for several years, but Mechanic's Hill has seen its prime.

SAVING OUR HISTORY

The Joel McLendon Cabin on Mount Carmel Road is Moore County's oldest structure on its original foundation. The McLendons were Scots, and migrated to northeastern North Carolina prior to 1696. Joel was one of several family members who moved westward to Moore County (then part of Cumberland County). He received a grant of two hundred acres on both sides of Buck Creek, later renamed McLendon's Creek. By 1760 he had built a cabin, a grist mill, and had cleared much of the land.

In 1764, the Cumberland Court ordered a road built joining the road to Cross Creek

(now Fayetteville) around Vass, and running westward into what is now Montgomery County. Joel was one of the overseers appointed to the construction, and the road became known as Joel Road. A portion of today's Mount Carmel Road in front of the Bryant House still follows the path of the original 1764 Joel Road.

In 1787 McLendon sold his land to Robert Graham; Graham's daughter married a Bryant; their son built the Bryant House adjacent to the McLendon Cabin around 1825. According to living family members born in the house, there was never a kitchen in the Bryant House – the McLendon Cabin was always used as their kitchen.

In 1969 the family of Flossie Bryant Davis donated the site to the Moore County Historical Association, and in the years since a number of people – including Rassie Wicker, author of MISCELLANEOUS ANCIENT RECORDS OF MOORE COUNTY, and Harris Blake, now our state Senator – have endeavored to restore and preserve these houses for future generations.

The McLendon Cabin and Bryant House are both open to visitors on the 2nd and 4th Sundays, June through September, from 2 to 4 PM. The address is 3361 Mount Carmel Road, Carthage.
