Palustris Festival - Our Scottish Heritage: Tour through Time, 1770-1900

Palustris Festival - Old Bethesda Harmony: Hymns From the New World

Sunday, March 27, 3:00 pm, Admission \$12, Children 12 and under free

Bethesda Presbyterian Chancel Choir, the Bethesda Ensemble and area musicians will perform early American psalms and spirituals at Old Bethesda Church. Emphasis on music from the "eclectic" tune books published in the U.S. during the late 18th and early 19th centuries, when publications helped blend European, African and Native American characteristics, thus establishing a style as varied as the peoples of the New World. Tune books like The Sacred Harp were popular as Americans expressed new ideas of freedom, religion and individuality. Program includes traditional and new settings of rare gems and old favorites with a chance to sing along. Dr. Larry Arnold, Professor of Music at the UNC-Pembroke, prepares the program from his research and interest in all forms of American song. The Bethesda Chancel Choir is directed by Nancy Arnold.

TOURS

Historic Hillsborough Tour

Tuesday, March 8, 2011

Guided tour of the historic town including Ayr Mount house-museum and Moorefields house-museum.

Ayr Mount is a 1815 Federal-era plantation house, restored and furnished with period antiques and fine art. Unlike the other houses in the Classical American Homes Preservation Trust collection, looks deceptively simple, even austere on the outside. There are no soaring columns proclaiming its classicism. On the other hand, Ayr Mount is far grander - especially in the interior - than one might expect



from a first look at the exterior. The ceiling height of 14 feet is unusual for this period as is the elaborate Federal period woodwork found throughout the house. Ayr Mount also was the first major residence built of brick in this area of colonial wood frame houses. At the time of its construction, at the end of the War of 1812, Ayr Mount was considered the finest residential structure in this central Carolina area.

Moorefields is the 1785 summer home of Alfred Moore (Moore County namesake). The home is a two-story Federal-style house with fine overmantels, moldings and Chinese Chippendale staircase. The interior furnishings and portraits, formal gardens, and park with avenues, walks and planned vistas were left as a public memorial by Edward Draper-Savage, a University of North Carolina French professor.

THE BARRETTS In Retrospect

A brief account of Rolin Barrett follows in this reprint of an article found in a 1943 Pinehurst Outlook. Portraits of R. A. Barrett & Lillie Black Barrett mentioned in Contributions are significant due to couple's having been married in the Shaw House by Washington Squire Shaw, then Justice of the Peace.

On a warm mid-July afternoon with the thermometer hovering around 98 degrees in the shade, Pinehurst seemed unusually quiet on this torrid day as I trekked my way towards a Coke fountain for a pick-me-up. Small groups of Village oracles were deep in retrospect under the large spreading live oak trees on the Village Green. Under one of these massive oaks, hard by the historic Department Store Building, sat an old-timer who was born on a

farm 53 miles from Pinehurst seventy-seven years relating to his little coterie interesting various incidents of bygone days. He was saying that he had sat under the same tree just forty-three years ago that very day. He

saw the Sandhills--with intervals of ups and downs--grow and prosper, he saw Pinehurst grow from desert waste into an attractive and thriving year-round village – a community of beautiful homes, destined to become one of the world's finest winter recreational centers.

Early in life, though the owner of three farms, this pioneer preferred other vocations to farming. He began work in his father's naval stores and operated a sawmill; he served as US Marshall; was the first Moore County Sheriff, the first chief of police for Pinehurst, and the first property custodian. For six years he served as Postmaster and was the first to stamp a parcel-post package sent out of Pinehurst, a package mailed by Herbert Jilson, Outlook Editor. He trimmed the first privet grown here, and sowed by hand the first Italian rye grass, demonstrating that privet should be pruned and that grass could be grown in sand.

He went to work for the late James Tuft, founder of Pinehurst, under a six months' contract and remained seventeen years without a break. He can recall when the Ralph Pages first landed in Pinehurst to occupy a cottage on Cherokee road, now the home of Mrs. H. P. Hitchkiss, and how he guaranteed Ralph's first grocery account as the Department Store. He saw Walter Hines Page, former ambassador to the Court of St. James' carried from the train to Currituck cottage, where he later died. He saw Pinehurst make history.

This pioneer retired a few years ago and has since lived in an attractive little cottage in Hickory on the northern edge of Pinehurst, where he spends much of his time under an umbrella tree in his garden. His wife passed on about two year ago. He has several children now widely separated; a daughter resides in Colorado; a son, Leonard, is Chief Petty Officer in the Navy, Myron is doing defense work in an airplane factory; Ralph is a manager of a chain store, and Robert is clerk in the Pinehurst Post Office.

This man of parts, who delights in reminiscence and marvels at the changing world, is Rolin Alexander Barrett.
