Spring Day Trip

Built in 1815, it is considered to be one of the best examples of Federal architecture. The birthplace of our 11th President James K. Polk in Pineville will be next. There's the restored homestead and gardens. Stowe Botanical Gardens in Belmont will be showing spring blossoms when we make the trip. There are a dozen theme gardens which include four seasons, cottage, canal, azaleas and perennials. The gardens feature12 fountains and a 8,000 square foot orchid conservatory. East and West Southern Pines Presentation

The Southern Pines Library is hosting a slide presentation and talk on "East and West Southern Pines," a book of historic photos telling the story of 50 years in Southern Pines' history from the late 1800s to the middle of the 20th century. Sara Lindau, coauthor of the book published by Arcadia Press, will give the talk on Sunday, May 4, as the final program of the season in the library's "Explorations for Adults" monthly series of free programs. Admission is free and the talk begins at 2 p.m.

Currently a trustee for the Moore County Historical Association, Lindau is a semiretired newspaper reporter who has worked for the Wilmington Morning Star, the Sandhills Citizen, and The Pilot. She is a freelance writer covering Moore County for Elite magazine, a military monthly published by the Fayetteville Publishing Company.

The book is divided into two parts: One on East Southern Pines (that is east of Broad Street) and on West side, which was predominately occupied by African-Americans, and to a large extent, still is. Pam Blue co-authored the book dealing with West Southern Pines, which at one time was a separate municipality. She has passed away so Lindau will present both parts of the story accompanying the slide show. "East and West Southern Pines" is available at the MCHA gift shop and the Country Book Shop downtown.



Knollwood Project

A new member of MCHA, Ed Bauer presented prints he made from digital images of the Moore County Airport taken by aerial photography in 1943 and later, when the property was Knollwood Airport and was a private airfield originally serving Pinehurst and Southern Pines. When World War II came, the U.S. Army took over the property and housed some soldiers in nearby resorts and in hotels. The images he obtained show the results of aerial flights from Camp Mackall to southern Moore, including Aberdeen, Pinebluff, Southern Pines, and Pinehurst as well as the airport runways and property

Shaw House Grounds Flooding

Ongoing discussions are underway between Steady Meares, representing the Moore County Historical Association, with the owner of Gold's Gym next door to the Shaw House property to attempt to solve chronic storm water runoff, pooling and flooding. After a period of heavy recent rain, photos by Steady Meares, a member of the Board of Trustees, showed standing water at the tobacco barn and water-logged areas on the back of the property. Meares said recently the water from the tobacco barn seems to drain toward the frontage.

outlines. There were gliders and planes on the ground at Camp Mackall in the old film, he said. The photos helped prepare the U.S. Army and the Airborne Divisions from Fort Bragg for an historic war game known as the Knollwood Maneuver that took place 70 years ago in December, 1943. It proved to General and later President Dwight Eisenhower that the 10,000 man airborne paratrooper divisions were useful and the same organization was used in the historic D-Day invasion of Europe six months later in June, 1944. Bauer was an imagery analyst during his career. Part of his work involved analyzing images taken of crash sites and other objects on the ground to attempt to find soldiers missing in action. The long-ago Knollwood Maneuver itself covered 2500 square miles. He has so far acquired about 25 percent of the lower part of Moore County, including Jackson Springs, West End, Vass, Lakeview, Cameron, Carbonton and "most ground in between these locations. The film was owned by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the National Archives.

Bauer still uses a metal detector to unearth buried objects that can be important finds related to local history, including but not limited to old coins. Bauer is a Pinehurst resident and a retired U.S. Navy First Class Petty Officer.

Scottish Clan Flags

Board member Don McLeod has completed talks with the St. Andrews Society and MCHA is now the proud possessor of eight Scottish clan flags that will be displayed at MCHA events to commemorate the area's Scottish heritage. Board member Marilyn Hartsell presented covers for the flags made from a tartan design.

Bryant House on Tour of Homes

The historic McLendon Cabin dating from the 1760s and the Bryant House (1820s) were added to the Carthage Tour of Historic Homes. That will raise the profile of them both.

Farrell, a native of the town with several generations of Farrells living and working there, is author of "Images of America: Aberdeen," a pictorial history about this small southern town that borders Southern Pines. Farrell also collects old postcards and historic photographs, is an avid military historian and collector.
